Thought for February, 2014 We have a Gospel to Proclaim!

Unemployment figures have gone down we hear. This is of course good news. However things are not that rosy for those still unemployed. The figures in our region are much higher than the average. It has been pretty much twice the national average for the last twenty years and it's worse for our young people.

There is the question of low pay, part time working and zero hour contracts. For some this is OK if it suits their circumstances but for others it is quite untenable and stops some from being able to have any financial security. How can one save for a pension (as we are being told) if one can't make ends meet? How can one pay the bills if you don't know when the next pay will be forthcoming?

The 1979 election slogan 'Labour isn't working' was used when 1.5 million were unemployed. A year later it was twice that. It became so bad, over 60's were not counted to hide the true figure. Long term unemployment has been with us ever since and full employment unlikely. 2.3 million is the figure now quoted but the real figure will be higher and poverty is a reality for many. Recently there was an uproar as the same picture was used to illustrate the growing reliance on food banks. All political parties try to put a favourable spin on bad news. So there may be a recovery and we may be doing better than others but things are still not good for the poor and in all the time the rich have got richer. Despite our difficulties and they are real, we still are more fortunate than those in Syria or the Philippines. So let's remember all the poor in our prayers and work for a more just and equitable world. Then we might really have something to celebrate

Recently a Water Aid representative met Hawa when he visited her village of Vaama. She had left her village, which had a handpump providing safe, clean water from underground, to escape the war in Sierra Leone. Having raised a healthy family, they returned five years later to find their village burnt to the ground and the handpump broken. As a result, three of her children have died as the only water they have to drink comes from a filthy polluted river. As Hawa told the charity worker, "We have lost our loved ones in the war and coming back home we are losing our loved ones again to these water diseases."

Today, the lives of her remaining children and grandchildren are still at risk. While Hawa was telling her story to me, her granddaughter, Isattu, sat on her lap. Her eyes were yellow. Hawa said that just last week Isattu had a fever and diarrhoea. In Sierra Leonne, more than 4,000 children die every year from diarrhoea caused by drinking dirty water. With your help we can save lives and give whole villages hope for the future, simply by providing a source of clean water.



HOPE CAN MOVE MOUNTAINS

When he was young, Norman Croucher enjoyed rock-climbing in his home county of Cornwall. Then one night, when he was 19 years old, an awful accident happened that for many would have meant the end of an active life.

Norman fell down a railway embankment on to the railway line and into the path of a train, which took both his legs off below the knee. Norman refused to give in to this tragedy. He couldn't wait to learn how to use his new artificial limbs so that he could start climbing again. The process was painful and difficult. He began by climbing trees, and then moved on to climbing small mountains.

More determined than ever, Norman aimed higher. In 1969, in order to increase his strength to take on bigger mountains, he undertook a sponsored walk from John o' Groats to Land's End – the furthest distance it is possible to walk across the U.K. He succeeded in walking the 874 miles in three months, raising for Oxfam more than £1,000, which in 1969 was a lot of money.

The next year Norman began climbing in the Swiss Alps and two years later he successfully climbed the Eiger.

Norman was chosen as a 'Man of the Year' in 1971, and again in 1978, and in 1979 he received an OBE from the Queen for his voluntary work for disabled people. He was also the first disabled person to be appointed to the Sports Council.

Of course, Norman Croucher has conquered mountains of a different kind too. He had faith in himself and never gave up hope. Not only has he shown just what a differently abled person can do, but he has also given great encouragement and hope to many people who are faced with problems that seem impossible to overcome.

You might not be able to climb mountains, but if you keep your hopes up, you might be able to move them. As Jesus said, 'In the world you will have trouble, but be brave: I have conquered the world' (John 16:33).
